The chaos of dealing with my oldest son's addiction and then the loss of a son to drug overdose turned my life around completely. The day of November 4, 2017, was one full of hurt, pain, and questions, but because I had turned my life and my son's drug addiction over to the hands of God, I found hope.

Faith, Family and Friends are now my priority—my 3F's. Thanks to God, I have found peace and I am a spiritual leader in my family. Because God is my priority, I start my day with prayer, daily devotional readings, and quiet time reading Scripture. We always give thanks to God before every meal and schedule many of our personal things not to interfere with church activities. I still work 60+ hours a week, but I find that I have time to spend with God and look forward to activities within church.

Today, I focus upon the positive and try to find some small yet positive outcome or impact in every situation. I am a "Glass Half Full" person with optimism and always think that good things can and will happen. The presence of God in my life and seeing the glass half full has instilled happiness, hope, and joy, even with the loss of my son.

A special thanks to God my Father; to my mother for her morals, principles of compassion, caring for people, and sacrifices she made; to my wife Ernestina for her incredible positive outlook on life and her love; to my late great-grandparents for establishing the foundation of God and church during my youth years. I would also like to extend my thanks to Dr. Neal and Dr. Earley for their powerful weekly sermons that continue to influence my life.

In addition, please let me offer much appreciation to Pastor Brian Kinnett for reaching out and inviting me to Men's Donuts and Devotions and Pastor Berna for inviting me to the monthly Men's Breakfast. A very special thanks to the Grief Share Facilitators and Program at First Baptist Church, PAL, and the Nar-Anon Family Groups for helping me to understand that I had no control of my son's disease of addiction and death and that it is okay to have peace and joy in my life.

In closing, I would like to share words from a sympathy card that I received from co-workers when I lost my son. In this card was a handwritten note from Isaiah Chapter 41, verses 10 and 13 that deeply touched my heart and had a major impact on my life.

Fear not for I am with you; Be not dismayed for I am your God; I will strengthen you; I will help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand. For I, the Lord your God, hold your right hand; It is I who say to you, "Fear Not, I am the one that helps you.

This verse ended with a personal note that said to "Lean on our Heavenly Father during this time. He is faithful and able to carry you through this time. Keep your eyes on Him." Thank you so much for reading and God bless you all!

Men's Corner

The Men's Fellowship Breakfast scheduled for Saturday, April 4th, has been cancelled. We hope to reconvene in the month of May. Below is the testimony of Mike Thompson from our March breakfast.

Thanks to God's mercy and grace, I can share my testimony with you. It began in 1960 in a small town in North Carolina in the Trading Ford community where I was a member and attended Trading Ford Baptist Church. My great-grandparents played a huge role in my life to ensure that I had the opportunity to attend church. They picked me up at home on Sunday mornings and at other times to attend church activities. I attended Sunday school, Sunday worship service, Sunday night service, and Wednesday mid-week prayer meetings as a youth and early teen.

As role models, my great-grandparents were pivotal in leading me to Christ in my early teens. When they reached a point in their health where they could no longer attend church, I also stopped attending on a regular basis.

During my late youth and teen years, it seemed that the family priorities were bowling, racing, and making ends meet. I attended church with other family members, but mostly on holidays. Although I know that my mother and other family members were believers, church was not a consistent priority. Even on Sundays when we would have family lunch, I don't recall regularly giving thanks to God. As I entered my twenties, I drifted further away from God. I married and had two healthy boys. I attended various churches but just did not seem to connect. Life was good, and I found that my career in maintenance working 6-7 days a week was my focus in order to support my family. Sunday was generally a recovery day as I was often too tired to have time for any church activities.

I soon found myself leading my family in the same direction as when I was growing up. We started AAU Baseball in 2000, a travel program with tournaments. As a result, church was just not in the schedule and, when I had a break, I was just too tired and would decide to rest on Sunday. I honestly believe I attended church on holidays out of guilt.

I am the true definition of a Prodigal Son, as I have been in and out of church over the years and have not consistently been obedient to God. It would take days for me to share all the things I am not proud of.

Life has been full of challenges with many events such as my father's death when I was four, and a separation and divorce after almost 20 years of marriage. This led to deep depression and even hospitalization. I cried out to God in prayer many times for help, and He gave me the strength to survive all of my challenges. After surviving this deep depression, once again, I returned to my normal where God was not the center of my life. Life was busy and, although I have always been a believer, I just was not obedient to God, even during many trying, challenging times. I truly thought I was strong enough as a man and I said I didn't need God's help.

Two situations centered around my oldest son that changed my life and finally made me realize that I was just not big enough or strong enough to handle life without God. They were in battling his disease of addiction that began in 2013 and his drug overdose later in 2017.

I decided last Sunday morning (March 15th), that if I headed to Home Depot early enough, I could be home in time to "watch" our church services. In case you are unaware, Home Depot is a popular place on the weekends.

Using the helpful shopping list my husband emailed me, complete with a photo of the exact items needed, I pushed my orange buggy all over that store. Suddenly, my alarm chirped that service was about to begin, so I tuned in. Unfortunately, that was the moment two guys needed to saw a piece of lumber the size of a wall. I figured since I had collected four of the five pictures Rick had listed, I could head to the cashier. The closer I got to the front, the better I could hear the preaching.

As I stood in a long line, I noticed a gentleman behind me was getting a little close to me. Annoyed, I was about to ask him if he had heard about the new social distancing policy. Instead he spoke up first to ask what I was watching. I told him I was watching a live stream of my pastor delivering his sermon and held my phone up so he could see and hear for himself. We watched together in silence for almost five minutes before he spoke again. "That preacher is pretty good. Where do you go to church?" I told him and he said he passed "that place" all the time. As I unloaded my cart at the register, I asked him to visit some Sunday morning. He shrugged and said he just might do that.

I've thought about that encounter all week. What if God kept me "lost" at Home Depot long enough so that someone could hear the Gospel? What if He left us "ninety-nine" watching Facebook, so He could minister to the lost "one" at the hardware store?

Certainly, I had nothing to do with it. God certainly didn't want or need my help, especially not my snarky comments. Of course, it wouldn't be the first time God had accomplished His work in spite of me.

Every single day brings additional news, mostly fearful, including closings and warnings. The soothing balm is knowing that this place is temporary, despite our best attempts with goods from Home Depot.

Someday, we are going to our eternal home. We will worship at His feet with a great multitude of our Family. It will be awesome to see those He has won.

Even by working around someone like me!
