Nearly scared us to death. We thought he was a mute. Sharon had always resisted getting another dog, but now she is in love. The year 2019 brings new things and new directions.

This year will bring new directions for FBC. This coming April we will have been on our property at Orders Road for ten years, and we are now ready to sell some of our 90 acres. We knew we didn't need 90 acres for our ministry, but that is how God blessed us. Since we have occupied our building, there have been many requests to sell some of our property to different companies for various reasons. After consulting with our Trustees and other leaders, this seems like the year to finally do it.

I will appoint a small steering committee to approach a realtor who will list 50 acres of our current real estate. He will be the broker to meet with and negotiate with all potential buyers. Nothing will be sold without a special business meeting and without the consent of our church family.

All monies from the sale of our 50 acres will go to pay off the remaining debt of 1.9 million dollars. We will keep 40 acres of our property for current and future ministries. For the time being, we are mowing about 25 acres including all the yards and Upward fields. Our leaders feel 40 acres will be more than adequate for our future plans and development.

During this year the steering committee will also be active consulting engineers and architects in regard to a permanent sanctuary. We hope to add this addition on to the west end of our existing building. This building would be a 900-1,000 seat auditorium. This is twice the size of the Neal Auditorium, but with multiple use on Sunday mornings.

Maybe you have some new things going on in your home this year. If not, stay involved in FBC and let's work for the glory of God in 2019. It's exciting. If you get tired, come by our house and take a nap with Chewy. Sleepy dog!



Members’ Ministry

Prayer is not a substitute for obedience; prayer shows our love, trust, dependence, and submission to God. Prayer is not a religious exercise. God owes no man anything, He gives His mercy and grace freely, He gives blessings freely, and He alone searches our hearts and knows our motives.

When we learn to walk in obedience with the Holy Spirit, our lives will be in His will and His will is where we need to live. When we pray “*thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven,*” we must trust God’s will in our life.

God’s word says this:

“Then Samuel said: Does the Lord take pleasure in burnt offerings and sacrifices as much as in obeying the Lord? Look: to obey is better than sacrifice, to pay attention is better than the fat of rams. For rebellion is like the sin of divination, and defiance is like wickedness and idolatry. From Our Children's Pastor



Trustee Ministry 2018 Annual Report

A special thanks to the large group of volunteers who can always be counted on to step up and assist with the numerous projects the Trustees and Baptist Builders work on throughout the year.

The flagpole on the FBC campus received a new flag, rope and hardware. New ceiling sound speakers were installed, and sound boards were attached to the walls, in the Neal Auditorium to reduce echo coming from the sound system. Work was also done on the sound system in Genesis. Cam lights were replaced in the Neal sanctuary and Genesis. The kitchen refrigerator compressor went out and was replaced. The parking lot 2018 budget remained the same for patching, resealing, and restriping. An extra sewage pump was purchased as a back-up. A new fountain was installed in the west pond on the FBC campus. For emergency purposes an AED "Automatic External Defibrillator" has been relocated to a more accessible location at FBC.

A memory plate and tree dedication was provided for Justin Butcher. A memory plaque for Barb Riley was installed on the Upward bleachers.

The Trustees received the report that Winkel, Green & Van Horn had notified FBC they were in receipt of everything needed to begin the Review Audit. The Review Audit was anticipated to be finished by the end of 2018. In two to three years a regular Audit will follow.

A new 4-wheel drive/three quarter ton pick-up truck was suggested to be put into the 2019 budget. A snowplow would be put into the 2019 Maintenance Budget.

In March, gutters had backed up at King's Kids Day Care and were cleaned out. The playground fence was moved out 15' on the King's Kids Day Care property.

Meetings with Long & Wilcox concerning the Brown farm property on FBC's west property line took place. The early conclusion was that Grove City Engineers were not agreeable on where the proposed sewer line is anticipated to cross the church property. The City is also leaning against some of the building ideas Wilcox has presented. The City of Grove City has requested that Long & Wilcox work with FBC in conjunction with a location on the east access to Orders Road. At this time negotiations have been tabled.

Men's Corner

The next Men's Fellowship Breakfast will be February 2nd at 7:30 AM. Pastor Josh Wright will be sharing his testimony. Below is the testimony of Joe Brandinger shared at the January breakfast.

I was born on Oct. 5, 1958, to Emanuel and Phyllis Brandinger, or so I thought. That comes later. Mom and Dad got divorced when I was one year old. Mom remarried in 1959 to Robert Wolf, my stepdad, so I thought. That comes later. There were six of us children.

As a young boy, I grew up in Riverside, CA. It should have been a really happy childhood because both my parents had great jobs except my stepdad was an alcoholic and my mom turned a blind eye to the physical and emotional abuse that seemed to occur daily.

By rights, I shouldn't be here today. My best friend and I went to each other's birthday parties until the 4th grade. That year, my mom would not let me go to Ricky's party and never told me why. I lost three of my friends that day. They were playing catch with a football when one of them threw the ball over the fence. The next door neighbor had hand grenades hidden under a tree where my friend found them. Instead of throwing the football, they played catch with a grenade. Two died immediately and one suffered for months until he succumbed to his injuries.

I was a member of the Arlington Foursquare Church and went to church and Sunday School every week because Mom said to. Mom and Dad went once in awhile. I found peace at church with people who seemed to care about me.

It seemed the harder I tried to make my parents happy, the more I failed. My stepfather was mean to all of us including my dog. In 1973, we moved to my grandparents' farmhouse, which at the time, I thought, was certainly a death sentence. I didn't have a clue how to "slop" pigs or milk cows, use a pick axe to dig up frozen pipes or just stay warm.

I joined the Baptist Church in the small town and enjoyed the time away from chores and the trouble that I always seemed to be in. I was saved the summer of my sophomore year and I will never forget the electricity that coursed through my body. I wish I could say that all that followed was milk and honey. I didn't realize how important being a child of God is. Life took over and God took a back seat to everything.

My senior year, I got into trouble with marijuana and alcohol. I went to jail for stealing and learned a powerful lesson sitting in jail for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's at 17 years of age.

My mother passed away when I was 28. She had cancer. She swore my sister to a death bed confession which was shared with me ten years later. It turns out that I was adopted. I don't know my biological family. Enough bad news. God is my Father and you are my brothers!

At 60 years of age, I am blessed! I have been married for 22 years. I have one daughter, one son, one stepdaughter and one stepson. I have four grandsons and four granddaughters.

I am a member of Men's Fraternity and try to attend every Wednesday. I serve at Feed My Sheep mission on Tuesday nights and hope that I can help those less fortunate than me. My wife and I enjoy coming to church on Sundays. I know some of you and hope to know the rest of you. I haven't met anyone at this church whom I didn't like. God has been more than patient with me, and I love Him dearly.

The more that I give, I get blessed back ten fold. The greatest gift I ever received was my salvation, and I want to help lead others to Christ. I love you, but more importantly, God loves you!
