"The Blessing of Being Faithful"

Revelation 2:8-11

Polycarp is a celebrated figure in the history of Christianity. A direct pupil of the apostle <u>John</u>, Polycarp lived between 70 and 155 A.D., connecting him to both the biblical apostles and the age of the early church fathers. Polycarp served as the <u>bishop</u> of the church at Smyrna (modern day Izmir in Turkey) and was recognized as one of the early combatants of Christian heresies.

Polycarp was arrested on the charge of being <u>Christian</u> – a member of a politically dangerous cult whose rapid growth needed to be stopped. Amidst an angry mob, the Roman proconsul took <u>pity</u> on such a <u>gentle old man</u> and urged Polycarp to proclaim, "Caesar is Lord." To this, Polycarp responded, "<u>Eighty-six years</u> I have served Christ and He never did me any <u>wrong</u>. How can I blaspheme my king who saved me?" Steadfast in his stand for Christ, Polycarp refused to compromise his beliefs and, thus, was burned alive at the stake.

The Blessings of Faithfulness

I. Jesus <u>understands</u> our suffering:

- A. His understanding of our suffering is because of His resurrection from the dead.
- B. His understanding of our suffering is predicated on His ability to <u>sympathize</u>.
- C. His understanding of our suffering is because He knows it's for Him!

D. "Suffering <u>ceases</u> to be suffering when it finds a purpose." *Victor Frankl*

II. Jesus shortens our suffering:

- A. It is shortened by <u>time</u> if the actual time is reduced.
- B. It is shortened in its <u>severity</u> when God's <u>grace</u> is increased.
- C. "In as much that I have often said, were it lawful, I could pray for greater <u>miseries</u> for greater <u>mercies</u>' sake." *John Bunyan*
- D. "It was strictly forbidden to <u>preach</u> to other prisoners, as it is in captive nations today. It was understood that whoever was caught doing this received a severe <u>beating</u>."

III. Jesus <u>rewards</u> our suffering:

- A. The reward of suffering is a crown of life. This crown is not <u>eternal</u> life but is given to those who <u>persevere</u> great <u>trials</u> and remain faithful.
- B. The reward of suffering is to those who overcome; they shall be spared any injury from the 2nd death.
